Demonstration Report

Contemporary/modern flowers in acrylic by Desiree Martin

Commentary by Vicky Anne Gatt

During the demonstration, artist Desiree Martin shared her unique method of creating abstract landscapes using acrylic paints. Inspired by her daily morning walks, she emphasised how these experiences provided her with a wealth of inspiration for her artwork.

Desiree began by explaining her approach to painting abstract landscapes. She mentioned that her morning walks allowed her to connect with nature and observe the beauty of the world around her. She would capture these moments by taking photographs and later use them as references in her artwork.



Using a charcoal drawing as a starting point, Desiree discussed the importance of capturing the essence of the landscape. She highlighted the significance of shapes, patterns, and the interplay of light and shadow. Desiree's process involved gradually building up layers of acrylic paint to create depth and texture in her paintings.



Throughout the demonstration,
Desiree emphasised the need
for experimentation and artistic
freedom. She encouraged attendees
to explore their own unique styles
and techniques. Desiree's use
of willow charcoal allowed for
expressive marks and added a
sense of fluidity to her work.

Desiree also discussed the importance of composition in abstract painting. She emphasised the use of quadrants to ensure a visually balanced artwork. By focusing on the individual sections of the painting, she ensured that the overall composition would be harmonious.

As the demonstration progressed, Desiree shared her insights on colour placement and creating focal points within the painting. She encouraged attendees to trust their instincts and adjust based on what felt right for each artwork.



Desiree's approach to abstract painting included working with negative spaces and allowing the painting to evolve naturally. She encouraged attendees to embrace the unpredictability of the process and make use of happy accidents along the way.

Throughout the demonstration, Desiree showcased her versatility as an artist. She mentioned her use of oils & alcoholic inks in addition to acrylics, highlighting the different techniques and effects that can be achieved with each medium. Desiree also discussed the use of glazes to enhance certain areas of the painting and create depth.

In conclusion, Desiree Martin's demonstration highlighted the power of abstract art and the role of personal inspiration in the creative process.

Attendees gained valuable insights into her techniques, including the use of charcoal, layering, and composition. Desiree's emphasis on experimentation, embracing unpredictability, and finding inspiration in the everyday served as a reminder of the limitless possibilities within the world of abstract painting.

Workshop ReportVivien McDonald - Still Life

A lovely day was had by all of us who attended Vivienne McDonalds oil painting workshop, it was relaxed and informative. This workshop was designed for beginners through to proficient artists.

To begin with we were given 2 still life colour photos and the same in black and white along with a tonal sheet and a good set of techniques to follow, also a colour palette was there to guide us, which was extremely helpful. Along with the photos was a table prepared with still life items very similar, or identical to the photo.

There was an initial discussion about starting off, some people preferred to do a thumbnail sketch while others were sketched straight onto a gesso based board/canvas

Vivienne explained what constituted a good composition, primarily dividing the background into thirds, this tends to be a given rule in composition, and by placing the focal point on an intersecting line makes the picture interesting.

To draw your eye to the focal point the still life items are arranged in such a way to guide your eye into the picture and out of it, colour is also used to guide the eye, as is tone. Remember to pay attention to where the light falls on the items. The above tips encourage the eye to move around the picture.

After we had sketched a rough outline on the painting surface there were a couple of things to be aware of. Ensuring that the objects are not kissing (touching each other), it is more pleasing to have the objects overlapping or spaced apart. Also, look at the crease lines on the tablecloth or any lines that may be conflicting, lines should feel balanced, you will know this when you look at the arrangement, it should feel comfortable.

Now we were ready to paint over the outline loosely using paint thinned with solvent, we used Burnt Sienna or a mix of French Ultramarine and Alizarin. Next block in the dark areas with thinned paint, followed by mid tones then light tones, cutting in around the shapes.

Slowly build up your picture using colours from the palette or make your own colour swatch. To soften lines, use a soft brush, for example between a highlight and shadow on a pear.

When the day had finished, we filled in the background with our chosen colour, carefully going around the objects. We could always come back to the detail later, but having the background completed before calling it a day meant when you return you only need to focus on the still life items.



A limited colour palette was used for this painting, it was all that was needed to produce a lovely piece of work. We were all very happy with our work, observing how each of us had our own style.

Some good pointers:

- Don't let eye travel out of the frame, break this with a blur or interruption.
- The eye is drawn to the greatest contrast, let everything else support the focus.
- Use less detail as you move away from the focal point.
- Using a "proportional divider" is handy for sizing objects.







Demonstration Report Hettie Rowley - Pastels

We were privileged to welcome the talented artist Hettie to our recent workshop, where she unveiled a wealth of pastel techniques that left us all in awe. The session was an eye-opening journey into the world of pastels, revealing the intricacies behind creating a stunning work of art.

Hettie's toolkit was a medley of pastel forms, including pastel pencils, pan pastels, soft pastels, and the newer pastel variations. As the demonstration unfolded, we marveled at how she seamlessly transitioned between these mediums to achieve different effects.

The process began with a focus on the dog's dark areas. Hettie employed a small palette-like tool, adeptly picking up pastels from the pan pastels. Mixing colors directly on the palette tool, she applied them to the canvas, resulting in smooth and rich hues. Impressively, she managed to create a harmonious blend of two yellows from the pan pastels, before intricately adding the finishing touch of teeth.

A surprise addition to the demonstration was a makeup rubber, used to create dot-like patterns on the background. To soften the effect, Hettie wielded a large, soft round makeup brush, showcasing her innovative approach to texture creation.

The eyes, a focal point of any artwork, were meticulously detailed using pastel pencils. Hettie's delicate handling of the pencils brought the eyes to life, adding a captivating depth to the subject.

Soft pastels came into play next, as Hettie covered the entire dog. With a finesse that comes from years of practice, she smoothed areas with her fingers, revealing the versatility of this medium.

A masterstroke was Hettie's use of pastel pencils for the final layer of fur. The care she took in varying the direction of each stroke was evident, resulting in an incredibly realistic texture. The gentle strokes she employed were a testament to her skill and dedication.

The culmination of Hettie's efforts left us speechless—the fur looked authentically genuine, bringing the dog to life on the canvas. The final artwork was nothing short of a masterpiece, reflecting Hettie's mastery and artistry.


